Week 3 feedback

<u>Feedback to parents</u> "One more parent meeting per year would be fantastic. I feel it's not enough at present." "Is it possible to get more regular feedback on my child's progress?" "Give parents clearer indications on children's progress against national standards."

We thoroughly appreciate that feedback is really important to parents; after all it is often the only measure you have of how your child is doing. I can assure you that school is very different from when most of us attended. Certainly when I went to school, league tables and assessment didn't exist, in fact neither did a national curriculum!

At Pyrford we track children within an inch of their life. Assessment has been hugely overhauled over the last 2/3 years by the DfE and this does cause confusion as how, as parents, you make sense of what attainment and progress data mean and which is more important. We are proposing on writing a help sheet for the year groups so that you can make sense of information you receive at parents' evenings and in reports.

We currently report back to parents on a termly basis i.e. autumn term parents meeting, spring term parents meeting and summer term written report. We also have 3 additional meetings per year for pupils on the SEN register. As a result of you asking, we are intending on updating you more frequently on your child's progress and attainment. From September 2018 we will send out additional short reports on your child which will hopefully help you to understand where your child is at and what they need to work on next. We will start trialling formats etc. during the summer term whilst trying to manage an ever increasing workload for teachers. Please though if you have questions about your child, don't feel you have to wait until parents meetings Feel free to make an appointment with the teacher or drop them an email (addresses all on the website). Education is a partnership between home and school with both parties striving for the best for a child.

Governors Roy Davey and Chris Newell visited the school last Friday to look at the way religious education is being taught. We started our visit at Assembly, where collective worship included singing, prayers and the regular Open the Book slot. Open the Book seems to be very popular and is an effective way of bringing to life some of the stories from the Bible. We were accompanied during the rest of our visit by Mrs Freeman and Mrs Bourne and we visited classes throughout the school. We were impressed by the enthusiasm with which children of all ages engaged in the various aspects of RE that their lessons were covering. We saw children discussing and analysing parables from the Bible, often illustrating their work with pictures. One class was discussing the relationship between knowledge and wisdom and we were highly impressed by the insightful comments that we overheard.
