I February 2019

Good morning. I would like to thank you for your understanding over our late opening this morning. My major concern in these situations is always the safety of the children and staff. We always do everything we can to keep the school up and running. When considering closure I need to take into account the following: the condition of the school playgrounds, pavements and car parks; the presence of sufficient staff to run the school safely and the school being able to provide food for children and staff. If we do need to action our snow plan, we will use the school website, email and text messaging service to communicate with you. We hope you found that effective this morning.

Thank you to everyone who has settled their account on Parent Pay. Your co-operation on paying at the time of booking for the remainder of this half term will be much appreciated. The Office staff are now undertaking the huge admin task of transferring everything to the new online booking and payment system. See overleaf for information on signing on to the new system.

This week Year 4 have been out to visit the Synagogue in Weybridge as part of their RE curriculum. I am told the children were full of information and engaging questions during the visit. Thank you to parent volunteers who accompanied the children on the visit.

I have met again with our school catering team who are going to be undertaking meal tasting next week. We try constantly to encourage the children to try new foods and to get their feedback so that we can add it to the menu. As always, we face the constant battle of the difference in what adults like to eat and what they think is a great meal and what children want to eat! We now have two salad bars which are out at every meal time, one is put out for EYFS and KS1 pupils and one for KS2 pupils. These are replenished during the meal service. The salad bar and freshly baked bread are there for children to have in addition to their main meal. We have also introduced unsalted/unsweetened popcorn to the salad/bread bar which has been hugely popular - including those having packed lunch who have decided they fancy helping themselves to a bowlful too! (packed lunch children are most welcome to bring in their own and it might be a good suggestion if you are looking for lunch ideas). I will feed back to you on the meal tasting. As an aside, the new online booking service will have photos of the meals so that you can get an idea of what we serve and should make ordering them easier.

Illness seems to have been the theme this week with many children and staff suffering from a sickness bug or flu like symptoms. There have been days where we have had up to 10 members of staff off, so my apologies if your child has had a different teacher on occasion. In times like this we all roll up our sleeves and get teaching where we can. As the sickness bug seems rather rife can I please encourage you to talk to your child about hand washing. We are doing our best here to combat winter germs as best as possible so if we are all pushing the same message we can hopefully get on top of this.

I have continued with some data sharing and explanation overleaf for those of you who are interested. I appreciate that assessment and data are a minefield; the information is purely there for those of you who take a keen interest. Over the weeks we will look at all aspects of the school to ensure you have balance and can gain a real insight into the school.

Finally, best of luck to all of the children who are heading off to the O2 today. I shall be going there myself later this evening so look forward to hearing those voices and spotting the Pyrford banner. My thanks as always to the staff giving up their Friday night to take the children and to parents for supporting the children.

HOT TOPIC: DATA continued



What is the difference between achieving the 'Expected' standard and 'Greater depth'?

The 'Expected' standard is the level which the DfE set as the pass mark each year. A raw score is converted into a scaled score and the scaled scores are banded. The scaled score banding changes

each year in line with marks increasing.

In 2018 at KS2 Pupils needed to achieve a scaled score of 100-109 to achieve the Expected standard. Pupils achieving a scaled score of 110-115 are graded as Greater depth.

What were the average scaled scores at Pyrford in 2018?

At Pyrford Church of England Aided Primary School 20.3% of pupils achieve greater depth within the expected standard in Writing (TA). This is 5.0% more than the average across Reading, Writing & Maths, 0.5% higher than the national Writing average and 10.4% more than the national average for Reading, Writing & Maths average.

If the school achieves so well, why don't progress measures show this in the media?

Progress for the school is measured between the end of KSI and the end of KS2. Pupils who attain Greater depth at the end of KSI must achieve Greater depth at the end of

KS2 for the school to get a 0 progress measure. Pupils who are either below the expected standard and manage to meet the expected standard at the end of KS2 show added value, as do those who are at the expected standard at KS1 and then manage to score Greater depth at KS2. As you can see from our results, having so many high achievers provides a real challenge for us to get positive progress measures despite having very high outcomes for our pupils. Progress measures reported by the DfE generally range from -5.0 to +5.0. I will report on how our KS1 pupils perform in the coming weeks.

Does this matter to individuals?

Not at all! Pupils receive their individual results and no progress measure is given to individuals. This would make our very able children look like they had made no progress! This is merely a tool the DfE use to hold schools to account. And for our internal school improvement requirements.

Which area is the school concentrating on most?

As you will have seen from our data, writing is our area of greatest challenge, followed by progress in reading. Our internal data (of which we have reams and reams) allows us to see exactly which pupils need most support and which groups/trends are emerging. This allows us to then plan how best to meet need; we have been conducting a lot of educational research and are building this into our development plan for improvement. Watch this space for further communication on what and how we are doing.

Why doesn't every child have steady progress?

Sometimes children underachieve for a number of reasons which are beyond our control ie family bereavement, separation, trauma, mental health issues, diagnosed special educational needs or long term ill health. We try our very best here at Pyrford to meet all of those needs and support pupils and their families when they most need it. Please do get in contact with us if you need our help. We try and reach out to as many of you as possible but we know there are more of you out there that might need our help or for us to signpost you to other agencies.

Whilst we are spending much time explaining data and assessment to you (which I appreciate is lengthy and difficult for non-educationalists to understand) I want to remind you that we are a fully inclusive school where our Christian values are fundamental to how we treat each other, learning and growing together. Data is just a very small piece of who and what we are about at Pyrford. We strongly believe in the whole child and see our job as preparing children for the next stage of their lives.
