

Pyrford Church of England Primary School

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Good morning.

As you will be aware, the Coronavirus is very much at the top of the news currently, including various countries' responses to the outbreak.

As a school we follow information and guidance given to us through Public Health and the Department for Education. The country has now moved to the delay phase of its strategy. At the moment, the directive is to keep schools open, however should the government direct schools to close (as a measure to try and halt the spread) we will be required to follow that direction. We have been busy this week planning what will happen at Pyrford. We are keen to be as prepared as possible should this happen.

Measures the school is taking currently whilst still open:

- ♦ All pupils to continue to wash and sanitise hands regularly. The school currently has a good stock of hand sanitiser, soap, toilet rolls, food and tissues.
- ♦ All pupils who look or report being unwell to be assessed by trained first aiders immediately the school has sourced a good supply of thermometers.
- Staff have been briefed on the school's plan and teams are actioning that, ie preparing work to be sent home, ensuring the website is updated, ordering stock, etc.
- Contact all external providers, suppliers, residential/trips and visitors to ensure they have business continuity plans in place so that the school can make suitable risk assessments regarding pupils.

Measures parents should take now:

- If your child has a temperature of 37.8C or above OR shows signs of a new persistent cough, you should isolate them at home for 7 days. Please inform the school office.
- Continue to promote safe hygiene practices at home.
- Ensure that you collect any medications your child keeps in school on a Friday, in case closure is announced over a weekend.
- Ensure we have your correct contact details so that we can communicate with you, particularly if you child is ill at school.

In the event of a school closure due to Coronavirus, the following would happen:

- The school will communicate with you via the school website, email and text messaging.
- All staff will be directed to work from home.
- All children will bring home a pack of school work and reading books. Answers to any
 relevant work will be provided so that any adult supervising the child can check answers
 with the child and give immediate feedback in line with school policy.
- The school will send hard copies home of all login details, ie Spelling Shed, TT Rockstars, etc.
- Parents will be responsible for ensuring that they and their families follow the guidelines and directions from the Government and Public Health England.

I hope this provides some clarity and comfort during what is quite an uncertain time for us all. The school is working hard to get policy and procedure into place and to do our very best to keep the school community informed. It is an ever changing situation which may cause plans to change. Please rest assured that we would only close if directed to do so. In the meantime, we continue to follow guidance and encourage good hygiene as well as providing sensitive care and language for children who might be worried.

The Primary Mathematics Challenge is aimed at pupils in years 5 and 6, designed to make pupils think outside the box. The questions are not heavily reliant on formal maths knowledge, but can be solved by logical reasoning. 6,650 children sat a paper in November and 2,521 of the highest scoring pupils were invited to take part in the Bonus Round. Whereas the November Challenge is an in-school

Challenge, the Bonus Round sees pupils competing on a worldwide level.

In total 1,590 medals were awarded and we are delighted to announce that Ollie Krikorian achieved one of the 195 Gold medals, one of only 9% of those taking part .

Well done Ollie! This is a marvellous achievement.

An amazing author A couple of weeks ago, Kerry Gibb (the author of It's a Kid's Life) took the time to stop writing her awesome books and let us interview her!


So, Kerry, where do you get your inspiration from? 100% my children. They're such a mischievous bunch. I really wanted to write a book that they would love to read.

When did you get interested in writing stories?


I've always loved writing since I was at primary school. I wrote a story about a cat coming on holiday with me and my teacher thought it was real which made me think I'd be good at writing.

Do you have a favourite author apart from yourself?


Enid Blyton, I think is great because children still enjoy them. It shows a great book stands the test of time.


