Staff have been working on the new elearning platform (Seesaw) which we are rolling out to the whole school. Year 5 have already piloted this and the rest of the school will be sent an email with joining details before the new term starts. Teachers will be able to communicate directly with the children and will post work and messages on there to help during this time. Again though, I reiterate, we understand that this is really challenging having online learning for families who have to share devices. So this is not a 3 line whip to get everything done on there, but a tool to help with those needing routine and a way for teachers to keep in touch. You will also receive an email to you and your children from your class teachers with a little personal update from them.

Although we have social distancing for all in place, as a staff community we keep in very close contact. We share good moments, humour and moments when colleagues need support. Sadly we heard at the end of last week that Mrs Cockle's eldest son, Nick (an army officer), had been hit by a lorry. He has luckily survived this trauma but has needed extensive surgery and has a very long road to recovery ahead of him. Due to the current Covid I9 situation, Mrs Cockle and her family have not been able to visit him in hospital and are reliant on the fabulous nursing staff to give updates. Please keep the Cockle family in your prayers. The Carroll family too have also had ongoing hospital stays. Baby Shea is now home with an array of monitors.

In the background, the admin team are busy trying to process refunds for trips, visits etc. They will contact those of you due a refund as and when we receive communication and all the mechanisms are in place. As you can imagine this is no easy feat and we are busy contacting providers and submitting insurance claims etc.

During the Easter break, please continue to follow all government guidance to stay at home so at to prevent the spread of the virus and protect the NHS.

I can't impress enough at this time the importance of keeping our children mentally well. The best thing we can do is to show our children how much they are loved and to help build their resilience during difficult times. When speaking with their own grandchildren in the future, our children will remember feeling safe and loved an all of the great things they did as a family; not the online maths lesson.

Reflections for 'school' at home: Rainbows

A note for parents and carers:

At school, your child will be used to taking part in collective worship every day (they might call it 'assembly'). This is not the kind of worship that some of you might be have been part of in a religious building. In church schools this collective worship is planned to be:

- Inclusive: something for children and teachers, of all faiths or of none to be able to join in with
- Inspirational: a time in the day to think about the big questions in our lives; an occasion that supports the school
 community's spiritual development, creates an opportunity to gather around and reflect on a common theme and
 'feeds' their inner being;
- Invitational: in school, children and teachers are invited to pray, think, or reflect, it is the child's or teacher's choice how they respond.

At this time, many children will be missing the familiar routines of school. One way in which we can help to keep that sense of normality is by offering these resources to schools to share with their school community at home. Please be clear: these ideas are for you to use, adapt, or not use at all. You choose!

Theme: Rainbows Look at the picture of the rainbow together. You can find it on the next page or using the link here. . . When do we see a rainbow? Share memories of rainbows that you might have seen with other people in your home. Things to talk about together. For many people, a rainbow is a sign of hope – that sunshine will return after the rain. . Sometimes a rainbow is a picture of the fact that it's possible to find good things even in difficult situations. One hymn writer wrote 'I trace the rainbow through the rain': what do you think these words might mean? For people who are Christians, a rainbow is a reminder of God's promises. Do you know any stories from . the Bible where God makes a promise? All over the world, people have been putting rainbows in their windows to remind each other that we are . not alone. It started in Italy, where the virus has kept people in their homes, away from each other for a long time. (There is a photo taken in Guildford on the next page) Why do you think a rainbow is a good symbol to use? Things to do together: Paint, draw or colour a rainbow to put in your window: many school children are putting rainbows in the . their windows for others to spot. You might like to use the reflection / prayer activity below as you colour. If you go out for a walk together (at a safe distance from other people, of course!), see how many . rainbows you can spot in the windows of homes. Wave at the people who live in that home if you can see them or pray for them as you pass by. Make a rainbow using a CD and a torch (or a ray of sunshine) It's best to try this in the dark. If you turn the . CD over to the side that's got no printing on, you can angle a torch beam to bounce a rainbow around the room. You can watch a clip of how to do it here. Things to reflect on or pray about together: Use the colours of the rainbow to help you think about or pray for people: Red is the colour of bravery: pray for or think about those people who are having to be brave at the moment Orange is the colour of waiting: pray or think about having to be patient and wait for things to get back to normal Yellow is the colour of sunshine: be thankful for some good things in your life Green is the colour of growth: pray or think about the people who are growing and producing our food Blue is a peaceful colour: pray for or think about people who are anxious at this time, that they would find peace Indigo is a sad colour: pray for or think about those who are sad or lonely

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Violet is a royal colour, the colour of leaders: pray for or think about the people in our government, that they will make wise decisions
