

Pyrford Church of England Primary School

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Good morning. Well it is lovely to finally see the sun shining on what has been a very wet week. The children are all dressed in mufti today which always causes excitement in school. Many thanks to everyone who has donated money today. All the funds raised will go directly to the NSPCC, the charity chosen by the school council following a visit from the charity earlier in the academic year.

As always, school has been busy. Staff have continued their training and development sessions after school with our focus on English; we are nearing the launch of our whole school drive on reading. We will be launching our project with parent workshops. Please see the information in the newsletter for full details. We spend a lot of time in school delving into our curriculum and data and linking that to outcomes for pupils. We have identified all the things we are really good at teaching and supporting in school and areas where we could do with some support from home. In school we have been undertaking much research of our own as well as reading published educational research. Please see overleaf for the facts around reading in the UK.

We want to engage families with reading. We are not expecting parents to be out buying lots of books for home, rather we want to work as a school community to provide an enriching reading experience where we foster a love of reading. Please see the workshop options available and those most suited to your child's circumstances. I would urge you to come along to find out what we can all do to help our children. In response to parent requests, we are running this event in the evening. We would like to encourage you to leave children at home if possible; we have lots of other reading events planned which are more suited to them.

I am pleased to let you know that Mrs Newman attended her graduation this week for attaining her NASENCO (Post Graduate certificate in Special Education Needs Coordination.) Mrs Newman has worked extensively undertaking academic research as well as case studies in the school to achieve this award. We are very fortunate to have such a strong Inclusion team at Pyrford with both Mrs Newman and Mrs Pollard holding this qualification.

You will no doubt have read in the press and social media this week of the controversy over a primary school who has elected to fine parents $\pounds I$ for every minute they are late picking up their child at the end of the school day. Don't worry we are not about to do that here at Pyrford! We are fortunate to offer well established wrap around childcare in the school. However, this did prompt me to remind you not so much about late pick up, but about late drop off. There are a number of regular offenders. The school gates are open by 8.30am, doors are opened promptly at 8.40am and learning starts the minute children are in school. If your child arrives daily after the gates are locked at 8.50am, by the time they reach the classroom they have already lost 15 minutes of learning every day. This adds up over the year to 47hrs 30 mins of missed learning. This does have an impact on outcomes.

We do understand that occasionally traffic is horrendous, you are juggling more than one school run or life at home means getting to school on time is challenging. We have a large working parent population and we try to meet everyone's needs. Please speak to us to see if we can help you if you are struggling with school timings.

Just to highlight to you that it is Mental Health week coming up in early February and we will be focussing on this in school. More to follow in future newsletters.

Reading Facts & Figures

- Statistics from 2014 show that one in five children in England cannot read well by the age of 11.
- Further research, conducted in 2015, found that similar percentages of 15-year-olds across the UK do not have a minimum level of literacy proficiency: 18% in England and Scotland, 15% in Northern Ireland and 21% in Wales.
- Students are less able to learn other curricula if they do not develop sufficient reading skills by the middle of primary school.
- Only 35% of 10-year-olds in England report that they like reading 'very much'. This lags behind countries like Russia (46%), Ireland (46%), New Zealand (44%), and Australia (43%).
- By the final year of compulsory schooling in England, the reading skills of children from disadvantaged backgrounds are on average almost three years behind those from the most affluent homes.



So what is the proven power of reading

 Reading for pleasure is more important for children's cognitive development than their parents' level of education and is a more powerful factor in life achievement than socio-economic background.

16-year-olds who choose to read books for pleasure outside of school are more likely to secure managerial or professional jobs in later life.

- Having books in the home is associated with both reading enjoyment and confidence. Of children who report having fewer than 10 books in their homes, 42% say they do not like reading and only 32% say they are 'very confident' readers. For children who report having over 200 books at home, only 12% say they do not like reading and 73% consider themselves 'very confident' readers.
- Children who read books often at age 10 and more than once a week at age 16 gain higher results in maths, vocabulary and spelling tests at age 16 than those who read less regularly.
