

Headteacher's Letter

Good morning, I hope you all enjoyed the bank holiday break last week. I don't know about you but I feel as though I have been chasing my tail all week!

Many thanks to those of you who joined teachers for our online parent meetings this week. I hope you found this a useful exercise and had time to talk specifically about your child. Just a note to keep your eye on the Seesaw platform as teachers often upload copies of your child's work on there so that you can have a look for yourselves. When children complete a piece of work they are particularly proud of or the teacher thinks is fantastic, we try and upload a copy so that you too can celebrate with your child.

Next week we start our programme of Covid-safe educational visitors into the school. Years 5 and 6 are having external visits from companies as part of the curriculum enrichment programme we like to offer to bring learning to life. The coming weeks are full of learning experiences for the children. It has been particularly challenging this year to organise events for the children. We are up against companies who are still furloughing staff and are not opening up until 21st June, along with no clear guidance on what we can and can't operate. This, coupled with price increases and demand being through the roof as all schools are in the same boat, can be very frustrating. So if something appears to be a little last minute in organising, please bear with us. We really are trying our best in challenging circumstances. We are hopeful that this will gradually change over the coming months. We have been glad to see a fall in Covid rates, however, we have been informed of a number of schools locally who have had to close bubbles this week, so we intend on keeping up with all Covid procedures and appreciate your support with this.

With Covid restrictions easing, the school is currently experiencing a rising number of trespassers in the evenings and at weekends. Whilst we do our very best to keep the site safe, it seems people are keen to bring ladders to get themselves over fences and hedges. We are experiencing groups of people choosing to participate in drinking and other activities leaving us with broken glass and other paraphernalia to clean up each morning. Can I ask that if you live locally, you keep vigilant and please call local police if you witness anyone entering the school site who looks like they shouldn't be (this recently has been via the rear of the church car park, Peatmore Avenue and the public footpath running adjacent to the cricket field).

Over the coming weeks, we will be reviewing our school procedures. It seems such a long time since we ran 'normally'. Circumstances have meant we have had staggered start times, playtimes and lunchtimes, PE kits are worn to school, parent meetings via zoom to name but a few. We will be sending out a questionnaire soon and would appreciate your feedback on procedures you'd like us to consider keeping and those which you'd like us to change. We are asking children, staff and parents for their feedback; restrictions allowing, we will try and come up with a plan for September.

Please keep an eye out for information heading your way about upcoming PTA events.

Fingers crossed the weather will improve next week as our swimming lessons start. The pool is heated beautifully but it would be lovely for the sun to start shining too. I know how much the children absolutely love this aspect of PE, so we look forward to being able to offer this again.

2 HAWTHORN


