

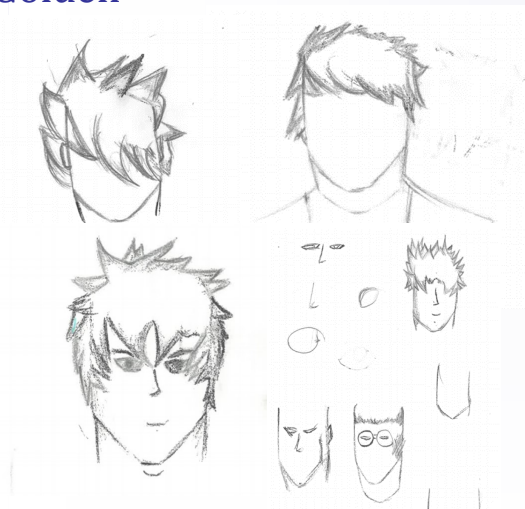

Headteacher's Letter

Good morning, time seems to be racing by! I keep looking at my calendar and my giant list of 'to do before the end of term' jobs.

I am really pleased to say that we've managed to get through another week without having to close any bubbles (I hope I haven't spoken too soon!) Many thanks to all of you for helping in this collective effort to keep the school fully up and running on site. We have been impacted with staff being picked up by track and trace and having to isolate, but we've managed to keep the plates spinning.

The children have enjoyed another great week full of activities. Many of the children have enjoyed using the swimming pool and outdoor areas and Year 5 are today participating in archery and orienteering activities.

Our photographer managed to come and take the rest of the class photographs this week and is trying to turn them around quickly so that you are able to purchase them before the end of term should you wish.

Many of the Year 6 pupils have undertaken transition activities with their secondary schools this week, whether it was on site or virtually. All other year groups also spent time getting to know their new class teachers. Our thanks to parents who have been involved with transition meetings as these are invaluable for your children and the staff working with them.

Please can I draw your attention to the note from Valentino's (sent as an attachment with this newsletter) who are advising getting any uniform for next term in good time. There are significant delays with all uniform supplies at the moment and all stockists and suppliers are advising early purchase to ensure that you have uniform in time. The school also has a large stock of nearly new uniform which parents are able to purchase. 
