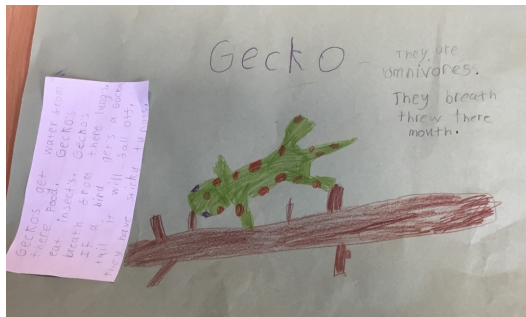

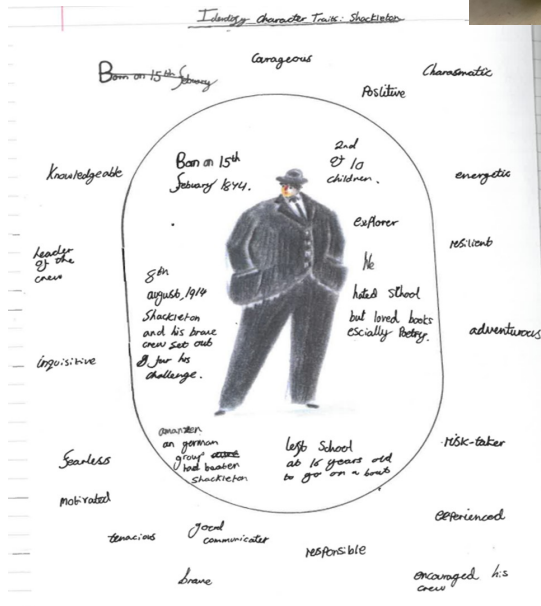

Good morning.

As always, it has been a full-on week at school. The children have just started to get into the Christmas vibe; I have heard the beginnings of Christmas play rehearsals from my office. I'm not sure who enjoys it more, the children or the staff! Please keep an eye out in the dates section for events we have planned. We are really hoping to put on as much as possible but as you can imagine it is trickier than ever with companies choosing to do things differently or no longer up and running after the effects of the pandemic. A classic example of that was the 'life bus', who we have had visit this week for all year groups to support our PSHE curriculum. In the past, a physical bus parked itself in the carpark and children went off into the bus for the interactive learning session. We had timetabled all of this to take place and then when fully reading all the covid risk assessment and having spoken to the company - whilst organising blocking off some of the staff carpark - we suddenly realised that the bus itself was no longer a viable option and the company had no intention of putting 30 children in a small space with no ventilation! Thankfully it wasn't a problem as we were able to use our own classrooms for the children to participate fully in all of the learning experiences. The children have had a great time interacting with life bus staff this week.

It was good to be able to meet with parents of Years 2 and 3 this week. It is so nice to be able to have parents back in the school building once again. Thank you also to all of you who turned up for our Friendly Friday last week. The children were thrilled to be able to show you their classrooms and the work they have been doing. I've lost count of the number of parents who were astounded by how much work their child had done. Of course, this wasn't news to us at all, but we had forgotten that for many of you the only school work you have seen was that completed in lockdown home schooling, which is far from what we would normally cover and expect in school. Thank you for the kind comments and positive feedback, this gave the staff a real boost. We look forward to welcoming Year 3 and 4 parents after school today. Please enter and exit the school building via the main school office between 3.15pm and 3.45pm.

Thanks also to parents who attended the online school cloud parent meetings this week. This is a good opportunity for you to catch up with the teacher to discuss your child. Apologies if anyone was affected by the fire alarm going off at the school at 7.30pm-ish on Wednesday night - we were treated to someone coming into the front entrance and hitting the fire alarm panel, a note to self that we need to lock teachers in school at night if they are here late! If your appointment was affected by this during the evacuation, we will be in touch to rearrange an additional time.

Behind the scenes we are busy as a staff team focussing on our curriculum intent and implementation. Subject leaders have been refining progression maps across subjects and we are starting once again to open our doors to other colleagues from different schools to come and view exemplary practice. We are driving reading and writing hard this year and will send out information to parents to help you understand the pedagogy behind the teaching of reading so that you can help us to support your child at home. More to follow in the coming weeks.

Sibling photos may be taken on either day working around timetables and Squirrels attendance where necessary.

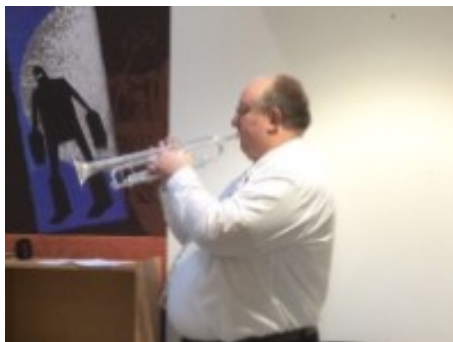


The Life Bus has visited the school this week and each class has enjoyed workshops, helping them to understand their bodies and how to look after them.

Many thanks to everyone who supported the Poppy Appeal and for the House Captains for organising the sale of poppy products.

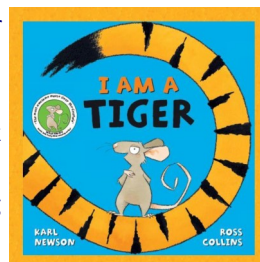
We marked 11am on the 11th with Mr Chapple, our brass teacher, playing the Last Post, which resonated throughout the school.

Light

Sources of light

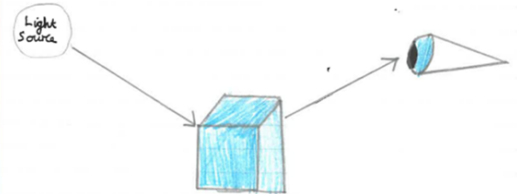
The main source of light on earth is the Sun but there are other sources as well. For example, a flame on a candle, a light bulb or a torch. There are many other sources like a fire or a firework. Also the Sun, which is the main source of light, reflects on to the moon so it gives off light too.

What is light?

Light is a type of energy. It is made up of tiny particles called photons. There are lots of different sources of light but they all do the same job - they help us see.

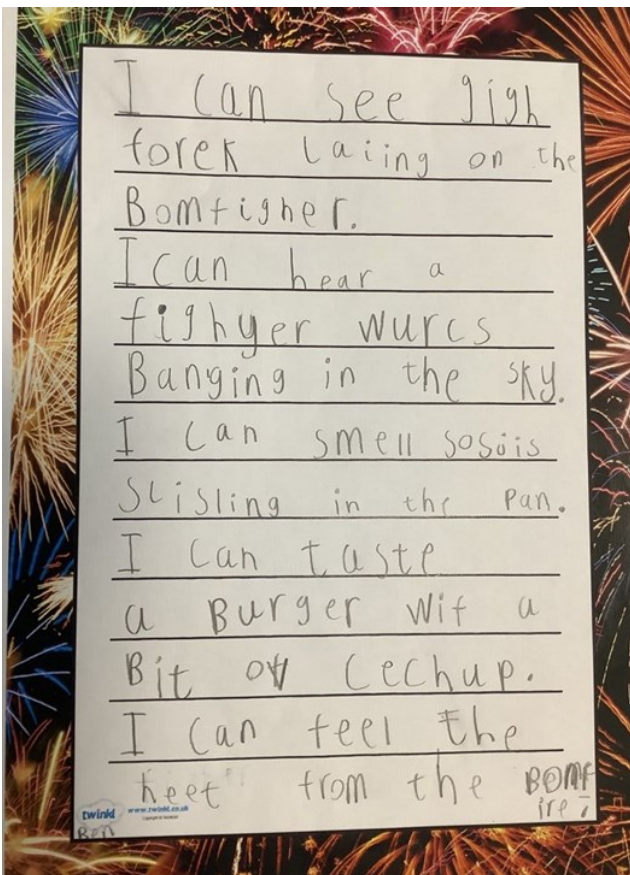
Dear Diary

In 2010 Matthew Hackney died suddenly from anaphylaxis, he was only 12 years old. The impact and devastation on his family and friends was unimaginable and their lives would never be the same again.

However, heartache and sorrow were turned into something positive which saw the birth of The Matthew Foundation, a small local charity aimed at supporting causes close to Matthews heart. The charity has worked to raise funds to expand their support to local causes and have gone on to hold charity balls, afternoon teas, barn dances, golf days and many other fund-raising events.

Initially money raised was donated to Great Ormond Street Hospital, Byfleet Cricket Club, Byfleet Football Club just to name but a few. These funds were used to help others allowing them to continue enjoying the activities that Matthew loved doing so much himself.

Over the last 10 years the Matthew Hackney Foundation has gone on from strength to strength. The money raised has enabled the charity to focus their aims on funding counsellors who work with schools across Surrey supporting children with their mental health and well-being. In the last 2 years we have helped over 100 children providing counselling sessions within schools, on-line and in private practices.
