Headteacher's Letter

Dear Parents

Good morning. After the torrential rain on Wednesday at school pick up, I am glad to see the temperatures have risen and the sun has been shining.

Thank you so much for supporting the Ukrainian appeal this week. We are proud to say that we have made a donation of £938 on behalf of our school community. Last Friday, staff also joined with our coffee man Mark, in raising funds and managed to raise £209. I hope you will stop by the cake sale which is taking place outside the main school office at the end of school today in support of the DEC Ukraine appeal. Many thanks to Year 3 reps and parents for organising this event.

Last week ended with our football team heading off to Kent to participate in the SE regional football finals. We are immensely proud of them representing the school and are pleased that each was awarded a medal. Please see our separate sports report for a full update. We are also super proud of our runners this week who performed exceptionally well. Thank you to Mrs Cockle for giving up so much of her unpaid time to train the children and to facilitate these events and thanks also to parents for supporting your children, it really does make a difference.

Year 6 enjoyed a visit to Woking Football Club this week, where they were participating in the Junior Citizenship event. This teaches children about safety, the role of the emergency services and dealing with wider safeguarding incidents. The children enjoyed the problem-solving activities and were taught a variety of life skills which focus upon how to keep themselves safe whilst potentially helping others who may be in difficulty or distress.

Year 2 headed out to Brooklands Museum on Thursday. This really was a challenge sending 90 children out on a visit along with a plethora of adults. Although these classes have had visitors in, this is the first time that they have attended a school visit and travelled on a coach, the last two years being so disrupted by the pandemic. There was high excitement and a little anxiety about heading out, but a great time was had by all. My thanks to the staff for all the prep work they did behind the scenes, jumping through the admin hoops, risk assessment plans and general organisation with Covid restrictions still in place. Teachers also put in an enormous amount of ground work with the children prior to the visit. Of course we also thank our parent volunteers who supported the children. Let's hope this is the first of many trips for these children.

We have had various Covid outbreak clusters around the school this week and staff have been heavily impacted. Please continue to keep a close eye on your children and keep them at home if they are unwell. I would also ask you to be patient if we don't respond to your emails or queries immediately, as we really are doing our best with lower staff numbers. Wishing those who are currently unwell, a speedy recovery!

Next week both years 5 and 6 have exciting curriculum enrichment days to look forward to so I am sure we will share photographs of their days.


6 LAUREL
