Headteacher's Letter

We are immensely proud, not only of the children's footballing skills, but of their commitment to the team and each other. Our Positive Playground Campaign Continues...

Last week we told you all about the physical changes we have already put in place to make the playgrounds more enjoyable places for everyone. These are all physical changes, items we have bought and made or how the Wellbeing Team, staff and areas of our school are being used. Now, we have introduced a new self-led approach for our children to help them deal with any issues which may arise in relation to other pupils.

We sometimes find that children are not telling anyone in school about something that is happening to them and not trying to deal with their own problems in any way. Therefore, we are going to use this approach to teach them how. The High 5 Strategy is very useful for all situations when a child is unhappy about another child's behaviour towards them.

To introduce the High 5 Strategy, Mrs Krynicki and Mrs Wright acted through a friendship-issue scenario during a fun assembly. Of course, some children (and staff) were very entertained, however, children from Reception to Year 6 did begin to learn and understand the importance of the High 5 Strategy. Teachers will continue to embed the strategy during class sessions and the children will be reminded in the play areas.

- High 5 values used to foster better relationships, personal achievement and improved student well-being.
- High 5 can be used to build student's social skills and resilience.
- High 5 can have a positive impact and help shape the schools code of behaviour.




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
