Headteacher's Letter

Good morning, what a glorious week it has been for the children to enjoy the sunshine. PE lessons outside have been enjoyed by all.

As I mentioned last week, there have been a number of curriculum experiences which children have been engaging with. This started on Monday with Year 6 participating in a whole day of Greek workshops and then Year 5 enjoyed their Viking workshop day ton Tuesday. It really is great to be able to have these opportunities back on offer at the school.

Our sporting teams continue to excel with Year 3 and 4 pupils doing exceptionally well at the WASPs cross country event this week. Alongside this, the school are honoured to be the chosen school to represent Woking Football Club in the National League Trust U11 Cup competition, following the boys' winning the Donnay Cup back in October. Our boys will be back in full training mode and have this event to look forward to in May. Whilst on our sports drive, I am pleased to see that the netball club is able to get up and running shortly. Alongside sports we are also looking into running more lunch time clubs for children with varying interests.

On Wednesday evening, children from the choir travelled to Dorking to represent the school at the Surrey Primary Music Festival. They joined children from other local schools to perform on stage with a live band. I am told they were amazing and the singing was fantastic.

Next week, we will send parents a communication which will outline our drop off and collection times and points for children at the beginning and end of day, as we look to relax more Covid protocols. Please keep an eye out for this communication.

Parents will also be receiving end of term reports for your child. Staff will happily discuss these with you at the upcoming face to face parents evening, after the Easter break.

Governors continued their curriculum monitoring role this week and came to visit the school to see the work the school has been doing on our drive for improvement in English. As part of this work, we are developing materials and videos to help parents support their child and to understand some of the pedagogy behind teaching of reading in particular. More of this in the summer term.

As we head into the last week of the spring term next week, our classes will all be taking time for an Easter pause. This is a time when we specifically focus on the Easter story and the importance this plays in the lives of Christians. This will culminate in a whole school worship visit to the Church of the Good Shepherd. This is an important milestone in our covid recovery, with so many of our pupils having not experienced whole school worship in the church. We hope this is the first visit of many and in the future, we would like to look for opportunities for parents and carers to join us in worship.

A final reminder that term finishes from 12pm on Friday 1st April (no this is not an April fools' joke!) Children in Years R - 2 who take a school lunch will be sent home with a packed lunch on this day.

All year groups took part in maths activities on Wednesday for World Maths Day. Here are some examples.


