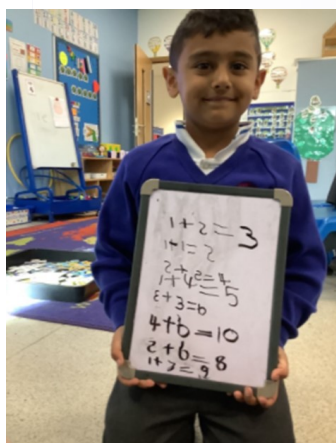

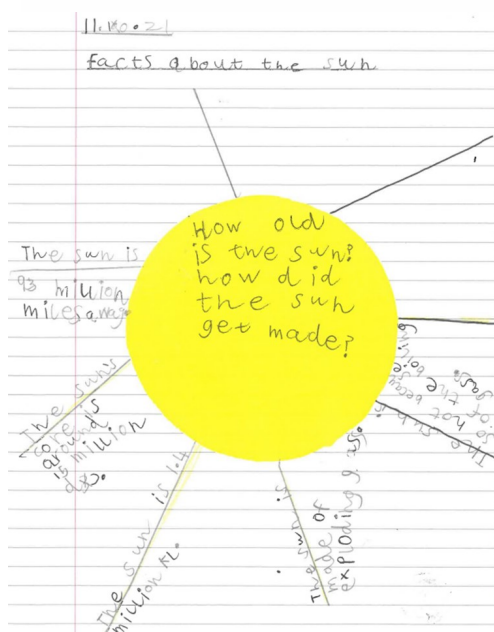

"I'm glad life is fairer now" *Sophie*



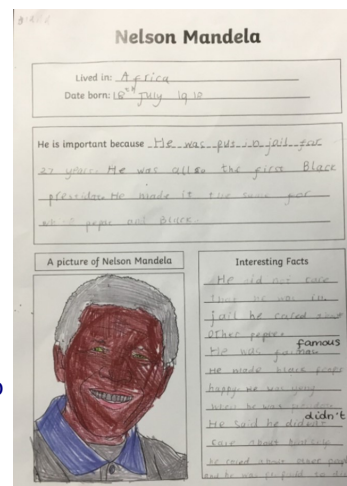
"Aretha Franklin made a song called Respect so people could be respected the same" *Olive*

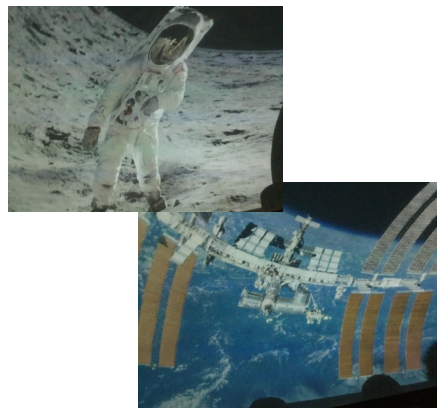
The Wonderdome was outstanding and it really did take us out of this world! The instructor (Steve) was amazing. He told us so many fascinating facts.

Stone Age tools

Paleolithic period

In the Paleolithic period (the early stone age), humans developed great ways to make weapons and tools like hand axes for skinning and cutting. The people would make weapons on the spot so is they just killed a bear for food some one might go and make a tool somewhere to piece out the meat.

Mesolithic period

In the Mesolithic period (Middle stone age) people made sharp stakes that they mounted on a stick to make weapons such as spears and arrows. Spears were long throwable weapons. They might use a spear to poke a snail (or a saber tooth tiger) to death or throw it at a mammoth to kill it.

Neolithic period

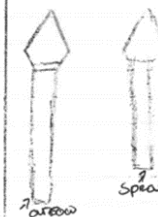
In the Neolithic period (late stone age) they made settlements and houses. They even started to farm crops, so they might make a hoe to plant trees or polish axes to cut down trees.

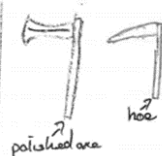

## Extended Schools

This week in Cookery Club the children made chocolate avocado puddings, there were certainly a lot of happy faces and plenty of spoon licking going on! Tempted? Why don't you try this at home?

### Chocolate Avocado Mousse

Serves 4-6 Prep 10 minutes Cook 4-5 minutes

2 large ripe Avocados \* 3 tbsp cocoa powder \* squeeze of lime juice  
few drops of vanilla extract \* 3 tbsp agave syrup \* 75 g coconut cream  
100g plain chocolate (70% cocoa solids)

1- Halve, stone and peel the avocados. Scoop out the flesh and put it in a food processor or blender with the cocoa powder, lime juice, vanilla extract, agave syrup and coconut cream. Blitz briefly until you have a smooth puree.

2- Melt the chocolate in a bowl suspended over a pan of simmering water, making sure that the bottom of the bowl isn't touching the water. Once the chocolate is melted, remove the bowl from the heat and allow to cool slightly.

3- Pour the melted chocolate into the avocado mixture and blitz with a hand held blender until thoroughly mixed, smooth and creamy.

4- Spoon into 4 serving glasses and serve sprinkled with chocolate shavings and decorate with fresh fruit.

### OR YOU CAN TRY THIS

Use liquid honey or maple syrup instead of agave.

Top with fresh strawberries, raspberries, orange or clementine segments or some coconut flakes

You could also add 4 stoned dates to the avocado mixture in step 1.

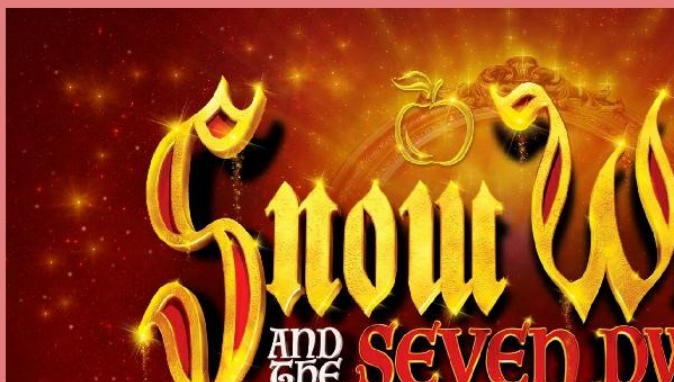
