Headteacher's Letter

Welcome to the end of another great week. Time seems to be flying by at the moment with lots still to do in preparation for both the end of term and next year.

This week our Year 6 children attended a Leavers' Service at Guildford Cathedral which was a wonderful opportunity for the children to appreciate being part of the wider church school family. Our very own Bishop Jo was very complimentary about the children and commented to me how smart they looked. A big achievement on what was such a warm day!

Year 4 had a great time participating in their Chinese dragon workshop this week too. It was lovely to see the hall aglow with colour from the large dragon puppet and the multitude of colourful parasols.

All class photos were taken this week and our photographer Nigel is hoping to get these to you as soon as possible so that you can order them in good time.

We were visited by external moderators this week as part of the teacher assessed process of moderating Key Stage 1 SATs outcomes. Moderators selected children's names at random across the subjects and looked through their work, as well as looking at test papers. Moderators meet with teachers to ensure that the teacher's judgement is accurate. I am really pleased to say that we had fantastic feedback and were 100% accurate with our judgements. Staff were congratulated by the external moderating team for 'the extensive evidence base provided, high level professional dialogue and excellent knowledge of the teacher assessment framework'.

We welcomed governors into school this week, both to hear more about our computing curriculum and to visit classrooms to see maths in action across the school. We thank our governors for their support of the school.

Our athletics squad were out this week attending the District Sports day. The team performed exceptionally well coming first and second in many events, so we are hopeful that the school will score highly in the league table when the results are announced. Well done to Mrs Cockle for training the team and supporting the event and to the children for their great skill and sportsmanship.

Next week continues to be busy. Year 5 are having their activity week including sleeping at school (I'm sure they are far more excited to be sleeping in school than I am about the prospect of sleeping in my office, I'm not sure how much sleep I'll get!) As always, my thanks to staff for giving up their unpaid leisure time to support the children, I am sure it will be a great week. Our Year 6 children will be visiting their secondary schools next week, whilst we look forward to welcoming our new Reception children and parents.


YFAR 6






