

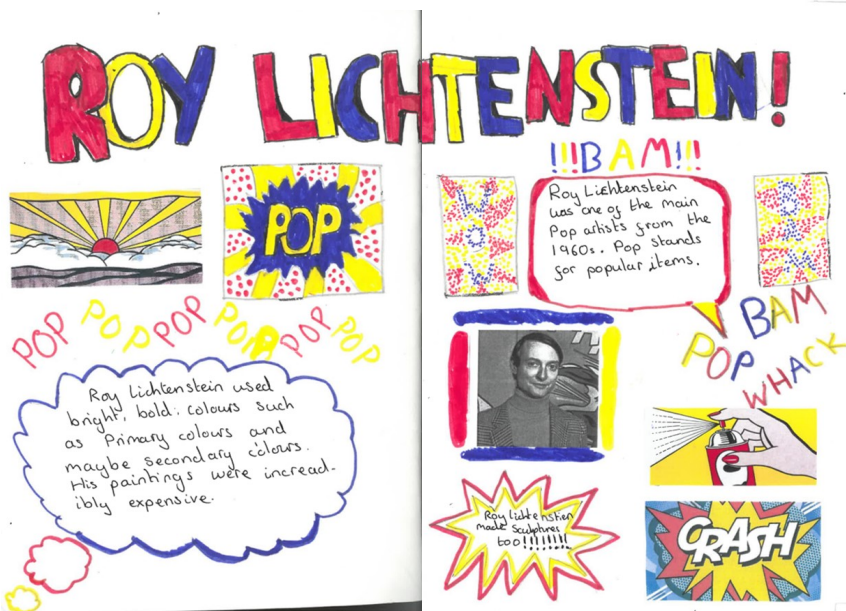

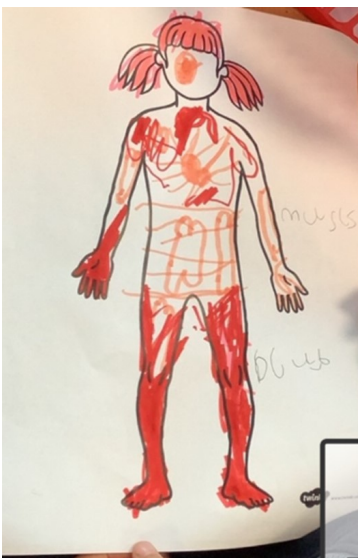

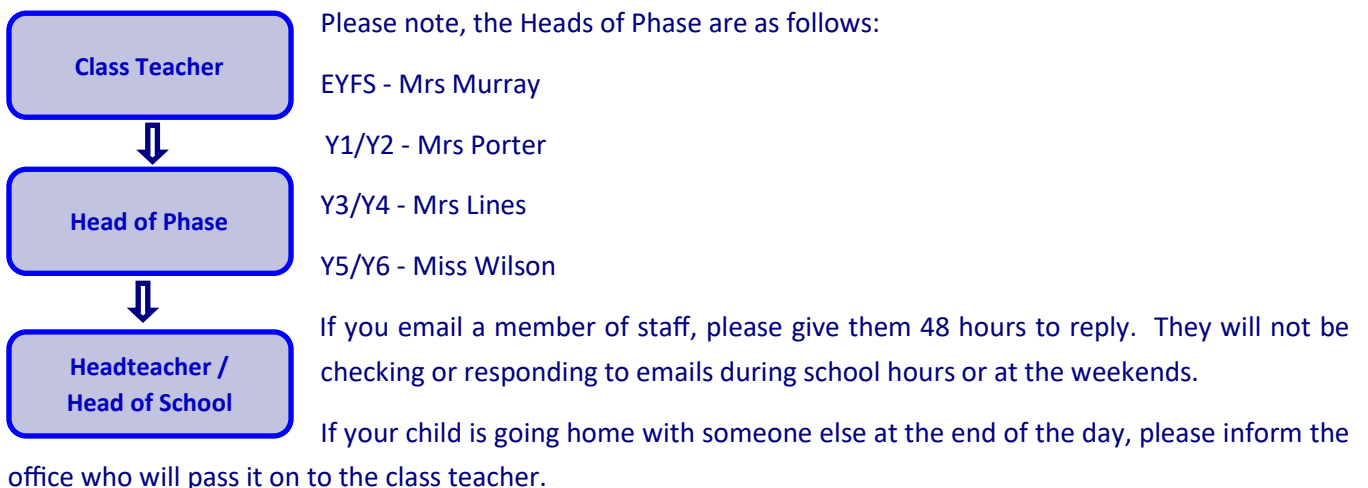
Head's Letter
