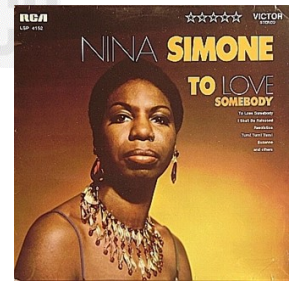

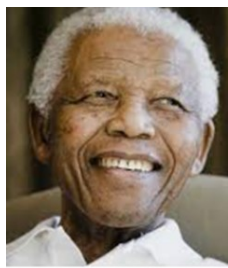

## Black History Month in Year 6

We have been learning about Black History through songs which were of the Civil Rights Movements in the 1960s. We were shocked to find out this happened all over the world, and that the root of these songs was black slavery and how they sang to unite and support each other.



**Year 4** have been reading all about Nelson Mandela this week. We discussed the meaning of apartheid and why equality is so important for us all.

**In Year 5** we have been making some posters reading all about black sports stars for Black History Month.

The posters include the following text:

- PELE**: Pele's full name is Edson Arantes do Nascimento. He is one of the most well-known football players in the world.
- SIR LEWIS HAMILTON**: Born 7 January 1985, Stevenage, England. Lewis Hamilton is one of the best F1 drivers in the world. At the moment he's got the most championships with a record of 7. He's the best black racer in the world. In 2020 he was knighted for his amazing achievements in motorsport.
- SIMONE BILES**: Simone Biles was born on the 14th March 1997 in Ohio USA. She is the most famous gymnast in American history with more than 32 medals from World Championships and the Olympic Games. She started her career as a gymnast at the age of 6. In the 2016 Olympic Games she won 4 gold medals. She was the first black female to win an all-around world title. She was the first black woman to win the 2020 Olympic Games gold medal. She is the only black woman to win the world title. She is the only black woman to win the world title. - MARCUS RASHFORD**: Marcus Rashford plays football for England, Manchester United. He has almost raised 2000 pounds for kids charities and school food. He has a really nice personality, special award for young people, good and bad, getting good parents. At 18 years old he became the youngest footballer to score in a World Cup. He came to England and was very poor.
- VENUS AND SERENA WILLIAMS**: Venus and Serena Williams are sisters and they were both born in the USA. They have a big passion for tennis. They have won over 100 single, double and mixed doubles titles. Venus is younger by one year than Serena. They both are amazing and represent black people so well.
- NEYMAR**: Neymar was born on 15th February 1992 in Brazil. He is a professional footballer who plays for Paris Saint-Germain in France and the Brazilian national team. He is the youngest player to score in a World Cup.
- Sir Lewis Hamilton**: Lewis Hamilton was born on the 7th January 1985 in Stevenage, England. He is the only black person to win the F1 world title. In 2020 he was knighted for his services to the country.
- Marcus Rashford**: Marcus Rashford was born on the 31st of October in 1997. One Rashford did a workout on TV. Rashford currently plays for Manchester United in England in the Premier League. Rashford has raised over 20 million for charities. He was named the BBC Sports Personality Special Award for recognition of his work fighting social inequality.
- Venus & Serena Williams**: The Williams sisters are one of the best tennis players in the world. Venus was born in 1980 and Serena was born in 1981. They both play for the American tennis team. Between them they have won over 100 tennis titles. They have previously both been ranked no.1 in both singles and doubles tennis.
