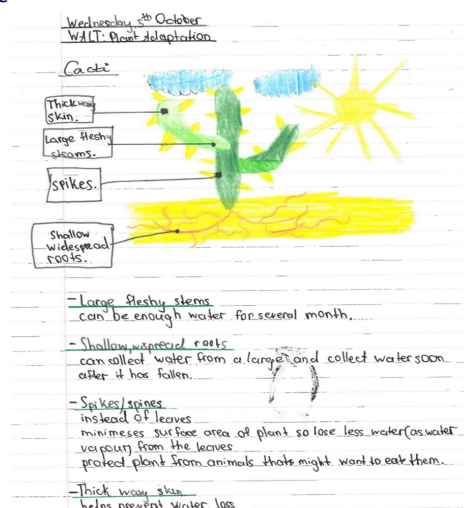

Have a lovely weekend and keep safe.

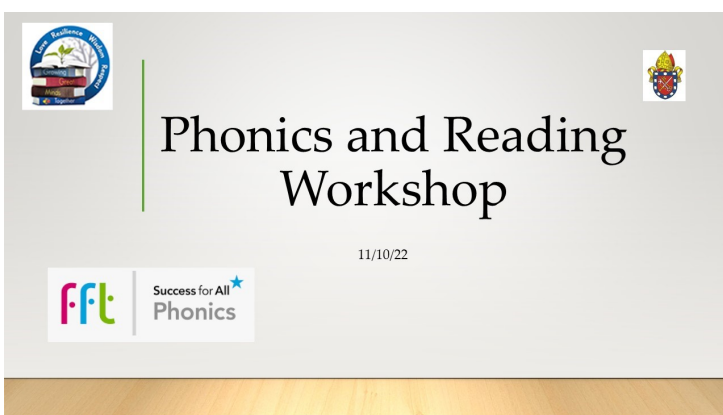
