

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Head's Letter

Dear Parents and Carers,

I was clearly a week or so early with my last newsletter, asking that children come to school with sunhats, full water bottles and suncream on. Speaking of next week, we have Key Stage 2 (Years 3-6) Sports Day on Monday and the EYFS and Key Stage 1 (Nursery to Year 2) on Tuesday. I hope that many of you are able to join us on these days.

On Wednesday, Year 2 have their trip to the Lookout Discovery Centre in Bracknell. Many platforms that primary aged children access have a recommended age of 13+ and sharing personal information (real names etc.) is sometimes encouraged by some websites. Ensuring children can talk freely with an adult about what they do online is key.

Another big thank you to the PTA for funding the new outdoor resources for Year 1. This will allow children and teachers to even better utilise the

spaces when taking the learning beyond the classroom. I know I may sound like a broken record, thanking the PTA so often, but it's only because they're always doing an amazing job!!

PARKING IN THE CHURCH CAR PARK

At a parents meeting earlier this week, parents parked in the church car park. The minister could not park which meant that the service started late. With this in mind, the church regrets that parents will not be able to park in the church car park for the Sports Days on Monday and Tuesday. The church has hall bookings and services attended by a significant number of elderly people with mobility issues. The Church car park will be available as normal for drop offs and pick up, but cars must then be moved promptly.

In addition, they have reported that parking at pick up and drop off has been really poor. Parents are parking in disabled bays, and not displaying a permit, parking in non-marked bays, blocking access and parking on the entrance to the car park, sometimes for a significant amount of time.

The school is extremely grateful to the church for giving parents the privilege of using the car park at the beginning and end of the school day. We are embarrassed by the fact that some parents use it in such an inconsiderate manner which could lead to this privilege being withdrawn for everyone.




Parent Governor Following the recent Parent Governor election, we are pleased to announce that Catherine Whittington was the successful candidate.
